PHOTOGRAPHY TECHNIQUE TIPS LINKS

Here are three videos I found helpful:

• Scott Kelby – <u>"Blind Critiques"</u>

This is a relatively long video and has a long period of advertisement at the front end. It consists of critiques of photos sent in with some demonstration of techniques to improve the images in Lightroom 4 or other image processing programs. I enjoyed it and think I learned from it.

• Mark Wallace - <u>Shooting Fireworks</u>

This is a short video with all you need for setup to take good fireworks images. The video covers aperture, shutter speed, ISO and other items.

• Gordon Lane – <u>How to Blur Water for a Dreamy Effect</u>


This provides the basics for taking silky images of waterfalls or streams. Basic information about shutter speeds, aperture, ISO and ND filters.

Our June 2 deadline for the next Digital composition will be coming up before we know it. The subject is **OLD BARNS AND BUILDINGS.** The main subject – the prominent object that gets your immediate attention-must be an old barn or building. The barn or building should look old by virtue of disrepair and/or dated architecture. As long as the subject meets these requirements, the photographs may have been taken night or day, any season, with or without people or animals.

As usual there is a 3 year time limit. Your image must have been taken between June 2, 2010 and June 2, 2013. You may enter two pictures, marking your 1st and 2nd choice in the file name when submitting (See example below). Resize your image to 1040 pixels on the longest side. Each picture is sent as an email attachment with a file name written in this manner: Old_A1_Hiscott_Don_Leaning to the left for first choice picture for A division person; Old_B2_Last Name_First Name_Picture Title for a B member's 2nd choice. Resized images will be received starting after the May 13 club meeting. Entries must be received not later than 6PM on Sunday, June 2nd. Send entries to competitions@sandhillsphotoclub.org . You should receive confirmation that your picture was received within 24 hours. Send any questions to the competition website listed above.

Last year our club President, Scott Duval, implemented a new committee: New Member Development. I was happy to take on the job. In the months I have been in charge I have worked closely with the Membership Committee for the purpose of welcoming new members and helping them with any problems they encounter with becoming involved with the club. Problem solving with submissions in competitions was one of the much needed aspects of the committee. Alerting new members to meetings and deadlines has been appreciated by those who are new to the club.

Seeking to get the impression of our club from a new member I asked Jo Ann Sluder, a member since January of 2012, a few questions about her experience with the New Member Committee and the club as a whole. Jo Ann joined the Sandhills Photography Club in 2012.

WHY DID YOU JOIN THE CLUB?

Because I have an interest in photography and hearing friends who were already members speaking about it, it seemed like it was a great opportunity to learn more. I wanted to pursue this as a hobby but I was unsure that just my interest was enough to join. Debra Regula and Brenda Hiscott assured me it would not be intimidating and it is a great group of amateur photographers.

WHAT HAS NEW MEMBER DEVELOPMENT DONE TO HELP YOU?

The personal invitation to attend and go with friends was welcoming. Debra gave me reassurance that my photography would speak for itself. It offered me an avenue to ask questions comfortably, especially when submitting my first competition photos. The step by step guidance was most appreciated.

WHAT HAVE YOU LEARNED FROM YOUR MEMBERSHIP IN THE CLUB?

That there are a lot of "great" photographers in the Sandhills area! Wow! I am so impressed. Each photographer sees things with a fresh perspective and captures their own vision. The critiques from the professionals are so insightful and I have taken notes on almost every photograph's comments. Making the notes provides me an avenue to look a little closer and learn things I need to be conscious about when shooting my favorite shots. I have learned hints like: watching out for white out, taking the time to capture the optimal light situation to capture the best image, framing the shot, not too much sky, let the picture lead you into it. When using a tool such as Photoshop be very selective in your choices. These tools can enhance or they can detract if not used properly. So, so many things I have learned.

DO YOU FEEL YOUR PHOTOGRAPHY HAS IMPROVED SINCE BECOMING A MEMBER AND IF SO HOW?

I see the world differently. I only see the beauty and I focus on smaller aspects of the world. Framing the beauty, narrowing my focus....that is what it has done for me !!!! Not just to photograph a shot, but everywhere I go, everything I see, I look a little closer. Having the opportunity to have MY photographs critiqued immediately boosted my confidence. It made this hobby instantaneously rewarding.

HAVE YOU ENTERED COMPETITIONS AND WERE THEY HELPFUL WITH DEVELOPING YOUR PHOTOGRAPHY SKILLS?

As above, it certainly has. I look more discerningly, watch for the lighting; yet, I have a long way to go to take the best shot. However, capturing the story, the beauty does not require solely technical camera knowledge. It is about the ability to see the shot and capture the moment.

HAVE YOU ATTENDED MEETINGS TO HEAR SPEAKERS AND WERE THEY HELPFUL AND INSPIRING? Absolutely! Each speaker has so much passion and love for photography. Whatever the speakers' specialty, the message comes across with conviction in their belief of how they approach their love for photography.

DO YOU LOOK AT PHOTOGRAPHY DIFFERENTLY SINCE BECOMING A MEMBER?

I always have loved photography and now I give it more respect as "Art". It truly is art

We hope that at least half our members will participate in at least one exhibit every year.







HELPFUL HINTS

OUT, OUT, DAMNED SPOT!; submitted by Marilyn Owen

In the 'Scapes competition, it was noted that some of the images contained dust or sensor spots that had not been removed. To rid your images of these, a few easy steps can be taken before tackling the job of cleaning the sensor (which is a very scary thing to do, especially the first time). If you are not using a DSLR, or do not remove the lens from the camera, you don't need to worry about the sensor.



First, you need to be aware that there are dust spots on your images. You are basically including a speck of dust in your image; because it is on a filter, the lens, or worst case, the sensor, it will be out of focus. It looks like a very

small fuzzy ball when you display the image on your computer, and you will only see them in areas of very smooth color. Bring the photo up in your processing software, zoom in to 100%, and then carefully scroll around the image where the spots will show – the sky, mostly, or any large area of smooth color. If you see some, you need to do two things: use your blemish tool to clean up the image, and then remember to check the camera to get rid of the dust (see below). If possible, check more than one image taken at the same shoot to see if the spot is consistent throughout several photos. If it disappears and then reappears as you scroll through the photos, the spot is most likely dust on a filter or a lens. If the dust spot does not move when you drag the image around, then it is on the monitor, not the image \textcircled

Second, wait for a clear or bright but gray day. Then remove all of your filters from your lenses. Using a microfiber lens cloth, lens paper, or whatever your camera shop recommended, clean the glass on the lens and both sides of each of the filters. One of the small blower brushes may also help.


Third, verify that the dust is gone from each element. With only the lens on the camera, shoot just the sky: focus on something like a nearby roof, set the focus to manual, and then shoot just the clear blue sky - fill the entire frame with just sky. The reason for the manual focus is that the camera's autofocus system will go nuts trying to focus on the clear blue sky. Now view the photo in your LCD, use the zoom function all the way to its limit, and then carefully scroll around the image on the camera – any dust spots will show up. You can then re-clean the lens, right there, and try again.

Fourth, once the lens is clean, add the filters back one at a time, shooting the sky after each filter is added. Clean each filter (both sides) until all the spots are gone before adding the next one.

If you still can't get rid of a spot on the images, try a different lens. If the spot stays in the same relative position in the frame, then it is time to clean the sensor. Be sure you know what you are doing, though, before doing that. Good camera stores may have technicians available to clean your sensor while you wait, for little or no charge – check with them first, but verify that they know what they are doing.

A few tips to avoid sensor dust when changing lenses:

- Make sure you turn your camera OFF; just sleeping, in auto-shutoff mode, is not enough. When the camera is ON, there is a static charge on the sensor that will attract dust.
- Try to hold the camera so the front is facing down to minimize gravity dropping dust into the camera while the lens is off.
- Make sure the mirror is not locked up from your last Live View shot.
- Never, never, never change lenses outdoors during pine pollen season!
- Be very careful when changing lenses near sand; I don't think our sand is too bad, but if you're on the beach, even a little breeze can play havoc with the sand and your camera.



TWO TYPES OF STUDY GROUPS AVAILABLE FREE FOR PSA MEMBERS Jill Margeson, YOUR PSA REP

1. (PID DD) Projected Image Division "Digital Dialogue is a place where PSA members gather and form small groups designed to improve the photographic skills of the participants. Every month each member posts one image for comment by the rest of the group. By sharing their work in this way, a dialogue is opened between group members and the learning begins. Conversations often include kudos for good work along with suggestions for image improvement at capture and in post processing.



Currently there are more than 50 different groups...Whatever your area of interest-we have a Group for you...beginner or seasoned pro..."

2. (PID DSG) Projected Image Division "Digital Study Groups...have a long history of helping those who are interested in improving the photographic skills and review techniques, through mutual assistance and interaction. The reviews generally follow the guidelines of exhibition judges, with emphasis on impact, composition and technical quality. Each group is a closed unit, password protected, which ensures that only the members of the assigned study group have access to the images and reviews, encouraging a free and open exchange.

Members with more photographic experience who are interested in helping others are welcome to get involved and can often provide more detailed assistance while honing their own skills. Having experienced members involved is very important to the learning process. Some simply serve as Commentators, providing an even more thorough critique and perspective to the group..."

How To: Simulate a Double Mat with Photoshop/Elements

1. Open image in Photoshop/Elements

Matthews did a while ago)

- 2. Size image to match simulated inner mat cutout.
- 3. Go Image/Resize/Canvas Size, add 1 inch* to the Width and Height and set Canvas Extension color to White.

- Jill Margeson (Information passed on to Jill from Len Barnard from a workshop Bill

- 4. Go Select/all
- 5. Go Edit, Stroke
- a. Set Width to 130 pixels* (30 pixels was about ¹/₄ inch)
- b. Set Color to color desired for simulated inner mat
- c. Set Location to Inside
- 6. Cut the real outer mat opening width and height ³/₄ * inch greater than the simulated inner mat cutout (#2)
- 7. Carefully align print to the cutout on the back of the real outer mat and secure with tape.

*Dimensions above will simulate a ¼ inch exposed inner mat with a 45 degree bevel cut with 3/32 inch mat board when printing at 300ppi. Other dimensions can be used as desired.

Advantages: You can use the color picker to match something inside the image for the outside mat; Odd sizes don't require cutting your own mat; It is easy to use the clone stamp to carry something of the image out into the border after the border is complete-see example of stem on yellow flower.

NOTE: When framing, you can't put glass directly on the photoyou would need spacing strips placed along the edge to keep glass off the picture like a mat.



OOPS! DID YOU MISS THE 'SCAPES COMPETITION CLUB MEETING? By your Roving Reporter

Dave Verchick, a previous club member, critiqued and judged 70 or so entries on the topic of 'scapes'. He quipped at the conclusion of judging that, to be fair, he had a negative comment for every image! Board members present have briefly summarized the pointers delivered by our judge as he critiqued the sea, land, city, and mountain 'scapes:

- 1. Clean the sensors of your camera. Check for dust spots as you process your entry.
- 2. Use a path of some sort to lead into the scene. Have something significant at the end of the path. Keep the eye looking within the scene as much as possible-don't let strong lines lead the eye out.
- 3. Check your edges and cut out distracting material.
- 4. Keep horizons level! Don't let buildings lean!
- 5. Let us see detail in the very dark and light areas (HDR?). Watch out for too much information-leads to confusion and lack of focus.
- 6. Eliminate the sky if there is nothing in it.
- 7. Have a foreground, middle ground, and background. Don't let material clutter the lines between the three areas (tree branches going into the middle ground line, background buildings too close to middle ground line so perspective is lost).



June's "Old Buildings and Barns" Competition coming fast

Have you poked around some local back roads yet looking for old buildings or barns? We have a lot of small old towns like Star, Carthage, Eagle Springs, and Wagram. Some buildings are still around from the Civil War. Hamlet and Rockingham have old mills and houses on their back roads. John Blue Farm in Laurinburg is another area to scout around for possible images. Side streets of Aberdeen, Pinehurst, and Southern Pines have some gingerbread houses and horse farms. 
